## September 8 • David Liban "Mortal Lessons"

#### September 29 • Nate Thompson "Backstage at the Opera"

What happens behind the operatic scenes?
Assistant professor of theatre design, Nate
Thompson, examines the unique processes
that bring theatre and opera productions to the
stage as well as the complex web of roles and
responsibilities required to make it all work.

#### October 6 • Jeffrey Schrader "Incendiary Mix of Sacred Art & Politics in Modern Spain"

Sacred art, which had been part of Spanish life for centuries, became a subject of contention in modern times. The perceived association of the Church with the rich and powerful led to punishments and outbreaks of violence that destroyed religious artworks. Join assistant professor of art history, Jeffrey Schrader, as he examines the enormous losses in the patrimony of medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque art.

#### October 13 • Nayantara Desai "The Women of Jazz: Nayantara Desai"

Women have had a significant impact on the history of jazz as they have influenced repertoire and language through their original compositions and unique performance styles. Jazz musician and music faculty member, Nayantara Desai, explores the challenges female jazz artists face in a male dominated field.
